Vlado Dimovski PhD Full Professor

Prof. Dimovski is internationally well-known and recognized scholar in the field of Management. Dimovski has been Full Professor at the University of Ljubljana, Faculty of Economics since 2005 and lectures at four undergraduate, four postgraduate, and one doctoral course. His primary areas of expertise are organizational learning, learning organization, modern management theory, and leadership. In these areas, Dimovski has built an extensive research and academic program at the Faculty of Economics in Ljubljana. He is also consultant for companies and international institutions and governments in the region through which he shares his gained experiences.
